## "Today salvation has come to this house."

THE STORY OF THE MEETING between Jesus and Zacchaeus is one of my favourite pieces of scripture. It attracts me because it is a succinct account of a conversion, full of colour and movement and even some humour. Who could help but laugh at the thought of this dignified but short man trying to scramble up a tree like a child, eager to lay his eyes on Jesus? Yet behind the humour lies serious intent: Zacchaeus is prepared to suffer the indignity involved in climbing the tree because his mind is for once focused not on himself but on the one who will bring him salvation: Jesus.

Zacchaeus is a senior tax collector. Having encountered a tax collector in last week's gospel it is fair to assume that tax collectors were of particular interest to Jesus. As they were such a despised group in Jewish society at the time of Jesus, the idea of any tax collector acknowledging their sin and having a conversion experience would have had a profound impact on those who heard these scriptures. Tax collectors would have been regarded as amongst the most incorrigible people in society – if anyone was going to be resistant to conversion, tax collectors were prime candidates!

The response of Zacchaeus to his encounter with Jesus is remarkable. He doesn't simply apologise and promise not to be dishonest again, nor does he promise to simply repay what he had misappropriated in his tax-collecting duties. His response is far more generous: "Look, sir, I am going to give half my property to the poor and if I have cheated anybody I will pay him back four times the amount." Zacchaeus' response is all the more remarkable when one notes that he doesn't even hear Jesus say "You are forgiven" or receive any command from Jesus as to how to make restitution. The mere presence of Jesus is enough for Zacchaeus to complete his conversion, a journey that had no doubt begun in him some time earlier. His conversion is evident in the selflessness and generosity that now marks his character.

The response of Zacchaeus is not the only one worth noting. The words of Jesus would have been words Zacchaeus and those in the crowd would never have expected to hear: "Today salvation has come to this house, because this man too is a son of Abraham." As is usually the case with a declaration of Jesus, his words bring joy to some (Zacchaeus) and anger to others (the crowd).

As a wealthy tax collector, Zacchaeus would certainly have put a great deal of store in his wealth and so his choice to make restitution by paying back so much of the wealth he had accumulated is quite remarkable and a sign of the power that can accompany an encounter with Jesus if one is open to conversion. We too are called to be open to conversion on a regular, even daily, basis. If there is something we are clinging to which obstructs an open and loving relationship with Jesus, then let us pray for the openness to conversion exhibited by Zacchaeus in our Gospel today.



## SAINT OF THE WEEK

### Saint Martin de Porres - 03 November

Martin was born in 1579 in Lima, Peru, the illegitimate son of a Spanish nobleman and a black ex-slave. His mother gave him a Christian education and he became a pharmacist and a nurse. Despite his father's opposition he entered the Dominican Order as a lay brother in 1603 and spent his life working for the sick and the poor. Many people of all ranks would come to him for advice. He had a great devotion to the Holy Eucharist. He died in 1639 and canonised in 1962. He has been named as a patron saint of those of mixed race.

## DID YOU KNOW...?

...that a plenary indulgence may be gained for the dead on the Feast of All Souls' on 02 November?

A plenary indulgence is basically defined as a remission of temporal punishment due to sin, the guilt of which has been forgiven. It does not forgive the guilt of sin nor is it a guarantee of salvation. It most certainly does not allow someone to commit sin or a pardon of future sin! The plenary indulgence may be gained for the dead, once only, by visiting a church on 02 November and praying the Lord's Prayer and the Creed. Three conditions are required for gaining the indulgence: sacramental confession, eucharistic communion, and prayer for the pope's intentions.
