23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Ephphatha, be opened!"

YOU WILL REMEMBER last week's Gospel in which Jesus was critical of those who pay only lip-service to their proclaimed faith rather than living it from their hearts. He emphasised the manner in which many people focus on following laws and regulations and believe that in living these faithfully they are showing love for God. Jesus dismissed such an approach to a life of faith as being unauthentic, underlining the fact that "what comes out of a man makes him unclean" rather than what goes in. For Jesus, the focus is love of God and neighbour; human regulations mean nothing if they don't lead a person to this manner of living.

This weekend we witness Jesus on the move. Interestingly, Jesus takes a convoluted route from Tyre to Galilee, moving mainly in Gentile territory through the Decapolis ("ten cities") on the eastern side of the Jordan River. This may be an indication that he is rejecting his own people for their attitude to their faith and so chooses to move amongst the Gentiles who are less arrogant and more open to his message.

At some point Jesus heals a deaf and mute man who is brought to him. It is an interesting encounter because of Jesus' intimate actions in this healing, touching the man's ears with his hands and touching his tongue with spittle. Jesus speaks in his native language of Aramaic and the man "spoke clearly". From a Catholic perspective, Jesus' actions are very sacramental. Indeed, this healing miracle of Jesus is reflected in the rite of baptism for children, towards the end of the ceremony. The minister touches the ears and lips of the one being baptised, saying:

word, and your mouth to proclaim his faith, to the praise and glory of God the Father.

At this point in the baptism ritual, I always mention that now the child has been baptised, we pray that he or she will, throughout their life, hear God's word at all times and in all places, and proclaim that word, not just in speech, but more importantly in action. It is, of course, the prime responsibility of the parents and godparents to assist the child in growing in the faith so that they will hear God and respond to what they hear. But no matter how well the parents and godparents do their job in this regard, it is ultimately up to the individual Christian to do all he or she can to nourish and grow in the faith throughout their life. How many people could each of us identify who was "raised in the faith" but fell away from it for one reason or another as the influence of parents and godparents became weaker? We ought to ask ourselves repeatedly whether we are attuned to God's voice and what our response is, no matter what our stage in life's journey. After all, hearing and responding to God in love is the very

reason for which we were created.








SAINT OF THE WEEK

St Egwin - 10 September

The foundation of the abbey dedicated to Our Lady at Evesham is attributed to an early eighth-century Bishop of Worcester called Eqwin. Very little is known about him since the earliest account of his life, written in Latin c.1020, is almost entirely composed of fables. However it does contain some local material which may reflect older traditions; among these is the account of the appearance of Our Lady to a swineherd at a place on the Avon where Eqwin built the church in her honour. This would be the earliest record of the appearance of the Blessed Virgin Mary in England. Since 1952 Evesham has become the place of an annual pilgrimage to Our Lady; the Catholic Church there is dedicated to St Mary and St Eqwin.

Pella, Philadelphia, Capitolias, Canatha, Raphana and Damascus (the modern capital of Syria).
